The Afton-based episode of Home Alone is the first of six in the series.

The series synopsis reads: "When night falls and

Man Allegedly Brings Meth To Courthouse

A man who allegedly walked through the Greene County Courthouse security area Wednesday morning with drugs in his pocket has a first court appearance Friday in General Sessions Court.

Cameron Bolyard, 29, of 352 Birdwell Circle, was charged by sheriff's deputies with felony possession of a Schedule II drug, possession of a Schedule III drug and possession of drug paraphernalia.

About 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Bolyard entered the courthouse and was

asked to empty his pockets as he passed through the security checkpoint, Detective Sgt. Chuck Humphreys said in a report.

A small orange container in Bolyard's pocket held a plastic bag containing methamphetamine, a brown bottle held one Suboxone pill and a straw "used to snort drugs," the report said.

Bond for Bolyard was set at \$52,000 pending Friday's scheduled court appearance.

Tennessee Wildfire Season Starts Sunday

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Tennessee forestry officials say outdoor burning permits will be required as the state heads into wildfire season.

The Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry says in a news release that the wildfire season runs from Sunday until May 15. Burn permits are issued when conditions are conducive to safe burning. Permits are issued free of charge.

Drought conditions and hurricane-force winds last November contributed to a wildfire in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park that killed 14 people and caused up to \$2 billion damage.

Burning without a permit is a misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail and a fine. Wildfires caused by arson are a felony punishable by up to 15 years in prison and \$10,000 in fines.

DUI, Reckless Endangerment Charges Filed After Crash

A woman involved in a two-car crash about 8:25 p.m. Wednesday on the Asheville Highway was charged by sheriff's deputies with driving under the influence and reckless endangerment.

Laura Ann Cantrell, 36, of 4770 Kelley Gap Road, was allegedly unsteady on her feet and appeared "somewhat disoriented" after being cleared by Greene County-Greeneville EMS at the crash scene, Deputy Jake Little said in a report.

Cantrell allegedly told deputies that she was too unsteady on her feet to per-

form field sobriety tests and allegedly admitted to using marijuana and muscle relaxers before driving, the report said.

Cantrell's car crossed the center line of the road and hit another car head-on, the report said. A man was driving the other car. Further details about the crash were not included in the report.

Her action placed the other driver "in imminent danger of death or serious bodily injury," the report said.

Cantrell was held on no bond pending a first scheduled appearance on Friday in General Sessions Court.

Counterfeit \$100 Bill Passed At Business

A counterfeit \$100 bill was passed Tuesday afternoon at the Dollar General Market at 835 E. Andrew Johnson Highway, Greeneville police Officer Nicholas Fillers said in a report.

The store manager told police that about 1:15 p.m. Tuesday, an "older white male" paid for groceries with the fake \$100 bill,

which was later determined to be counterfeit.

A cashier marked the bill with a counterfeit detection pen "but accepted it anyway because she didn't know how dark the mark was supposed to be," the report said.

The counterfeit bill was taken into evidence.

Family Held Captive By Taliban-Linked Group Released Wednesday

ISLAMABAD (AP) — An American woman, her Canadian husband and their three young children have been released after years of being held captive by a network with ties to the Taliban, U.S. and Pakistani officials said Thursday.

U.S. officials say Pakistan secured the release of Caitlan Coleman of Stewartstown, Pennsylvania, and her husband, Canadian Joshua Boyle, who were abducted five years ago while traveling in Afghanistan and had been held by the Haqqani network in Pakistan.

Coleman was pregnant when she was captured. The couple had three children while in captivity, and all have been freed, U.S. officials say.

A U.S. national security official, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss an ongoing operation, commended

Pakistan for their critical assistance in securing the family's release — and described the cooperation as an important step in the right direction for U.S.-Pakistani relations.

The U.S. has long criticized Pakistan for failing to aggressively go after the Haqqanis, who have been behind many attacks against U.S. and allied forces in Afghanistan.

In Pakistan, its military said in a statement that U.S. intelligence agencies had been tracking the hostages and discovered they had come into Pakistan on Oct. 11 through its tribal areas bordering Afghanistan.

"All hostages were recovered safe and sound and are being repatriated to the country of their origin," the military said.

Three Pakistani military officials, all speaking on condition of anonymity as they weren't allowed to speak to journalists, also confirmed the hostages' identities.

Algerald Miller, 35, of 81 Highland Park Lane, was charged with possession of a schedule II drug, possession of a prohibited weapon and violation of probation on Wednesday. The officer also determined that Miller had a violation of probation warrant, third offense. No bond is set for Miller.

Kevin L. Roberts, 30, of 1350 Sunnyside Road, faces several charges following his arrest on Wednesday. According to a report, a Greeneville police officer witnessed Roberts and another person throwing items under the vehicle they were exiting when he arrived at 121 Serral

Drive for a call about drug violations. Roberts also tossed a glass pipe and a nearby truck, the report said. Roberts was placed under arrest for tampering with evidence and a subsequent search turned up a crystal substance, suspected to be methamphetamine, and a cut straw that were concealed in a cigarette pack in his hand. A BB pistol was found under the driver's side of the vehicle and a set of brass knuckles in the middle console. The report says Roberts admitted they belonged to him. Roberts is charged with tampering with evidence, possession of a schedule III drug, possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of prohibited weapons.

Bond for Roberts is set at \$13,000.

Anthony Wade Freeman Jr., 23, of 146 Riffe Branch Road, laeger, West Virginia, was arrested for public intoxication on Tuesday. According to a report, a Greene County sheriff's deputy responded to the Wendy's-Marathon station at Interstate 81 exit 23 for a call about a man slumped over in a vehicle. When the deputy arrived, Freeman was found leaning on the counter inside Wendy's. The report says he smelled of alcohol and had slurred speech. Bond for Freeman is set at \$300.

A man reported a heat pump and internal air unit was removed from his Wil-


erson Road residence on Tuesday. The report says an electric stove was also removed from the kitchen, the toilette tank was broken and one of the front windows had been shot out with a BB. The items taken are valued at \$5,850. The broken window is valued at \$400.

A man reported that his 4-wheeler was stolen from a residence on Starnes Lane sometime between Oct. 6 and Oct. 9. The man left the vehicle, containing two fishing poles, at his mother-in-law's house while he went on vacation. The vehicle didn't have a battery and must have been removed with a
