Historic Zoners To Consider General Morgan Inn Window Replacements

The Greeneville Historic Zoning Commission will consider proposed replacement windows for the General Morgan Inn and a recommendation to fill a membership vacancy Tuesday.

To review the application for the windows at the General Morgan Inn, Tuesday's meeting will differ from the normal session due to the extra effort by the hotel to allow the commission to review on-site two types of windows for the historic structure.

The commission will convene at 8:30 a.m. in the board room at Greeneville Town Hall to begin the meeting and address part of the agenda.

The meeting will be recessed so the commission can reconvene at the General Morgan Inn to consider the application for the replacement windows. The hotel has installed samples of two different styles for review.

Anyone interested in attending the meeting and accompanying the commission to the hotel is asked to call the town's Building and Planning Office by Monday afternoon to allow planning for adequate transportation.

Also on the agenda is consideration of a recommendation to the Greeneville Board of Mayor Aldermen for filling an existing vacancy on the commission.

Three people have applied for the vacancy: Teresa Hammer, Peter Higgins and Dr. Don Sexton.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen tabled action on the appointment during its April 3 meeting, requesting that the commission make a recommendation for filling the vacancy.

Airport Transfer Will Be Focus Of Tuesday Greeneville BMA Meeting

Three items related to the transfer of the airport to sole oversight by the town will be considered Tuesday by the Greeneville Board of Mayor and Aldermen.

The board faces a lengthy agenda of more than a dozen action items when it meets at 4 p.m. in the G. Thomas Love Board Room at the Greeneville Light and Power System office on College Street.

The three items related to the Greeneville-Greene County Municipal Airport are a part of the legal process to end a joint venture between Greeneville and Greene County, placing oversight of its operations solely with the town. The Greene County Commission voted last fall to end the partnership.

The board will consider authorizing the city administrator to negotiate and enter into an agreement with Greene County and the Greeneville-Greene County Airport Authority for transfer of the airport to the town and to terminate the joint venture agreement.

A public hearing will be held on an ordinance to establish a Municipal Airport Authority. The ordinance will be considered by the board for approval on second and final reading.

The board will also consider an appointment and confirm reappointments to the Municipal Airport Authority. Last month, the board made appointments to the new governing body, which was required to be in place as part of the process of incorporating the new Airport Authority with the state.

In other business, the board will consider the subdivision of the Tract 5 property in Hardin Industrial Complex on Baileyton Road. A grading site plan was approved for the property April 10 by the Greeneville Regional Planning Commission. The town and the Greene County Partnership have received a grant for site preparation to made the tract "pad ready" to assist in industrial recruitment.

Requests for equipment purchases by the fire, police and public works departments will be considered. On the agenda are purchases of a thermal-imaging camera for the fire department, two mobile radios for the police department and a tipper arm for a small bandstop truck used by public works.

An appointment to the Greeneville Historic Zoning Commission and appointments to the Health and Educational Facilities Board will also be considered.

A contract with the Tennessee Department of Transportation for routine maintenance of state routes within the town is also on the agenda.

The town's audit report for the 2016-17 fiscal year will be presented.

Two special event applications and three special event sign requests are also on the agenda.

County Commission, Election Commission, Animal Control Board Meet This Week

The Greene County Commission, Greene County Election Commission and Greene County Animal Control Board all have meetings scheduled in the coming week.

The first meeting will be the monthly meeting of the full Greene County Commission 6 p.m. Monday at the Greene County Courthouse.

Items on the agenda include:

- a resolution to amend the 2017-18 fiscal year Greene County Schools general purpose budget for capital outlay projects;
- a resolution to amend the Greene County Schools budget for Read to Be Ready summer grants for \$249,700;
- a resolution to correct the General Sessions Court Judge salary for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2018;
- a resolution to appropriate \$15,315 to the Greene County Sheriff's Department for funds from various sources for fiscal year ending on June 30, 2018;
- a resolution to budget \$4,500 for the sale of equipment in solid waste for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018; and
- a resolution to appropriate \$100,000 for the purchase of a used front-end loader in solid waste for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2018.

The Greene County Election Commission will meet in a special, called session Tuesday at 4 p.m. at the commission's office at 218 N. Main St.

The Election Commission will review and qualify nominating positions for the Aug. 2 state primary, county general and Baileyton, Greeneville and Mosheim municipal elections. Commissioners will also consider the 2018-19 budget.

On Wednesday at 3 p.m., the Animal Control Board will meet in the conference room at the Greene County Courthouse Annex. No advanced agenda was available.

Mosheim Planners OK Two Subdivision Plats

The Mosheim Planning Commission gave approval to two subdivision plat requests at its regular monthly meeting Thursday.

The first involved two lots located on Cherokee Street within the Kirk Acres subdivision. The property owner requested a realigning of the shared lot line away from a planned residence and driveway.

The second request came from the owners of the Hey'L Yeah Bar & Grill, located at 16130 W. Andrew Johnson Highway. Property owners Kenneth and Jo Ellen Tolley requested that the lot line of two lots be moved from the existing building in order to meet setback requirements. They said that they are planning on expanding outdoor entertainment space at the venue, which they have owned for the past five years.
