The big goal, Butch says, is teaching kids at an early age to be good stewards of their precious natural resources.

"We saw a need to make everyone aware of what goes on in a stream, how to pick up trash

in a stream, how to be safe and not get caught with your hooks. Things like that," he said. "We thought it would be a good idea to have a kids fishing day. The kids can learn about fish, ecology and nature itself."

In addition to the fishing day, the Cherokee Chapter of Trout Unlimited has put more than 20 aquariums in high schools and

middle schools in upper East Tennessee, and they're working on getting aquariums in schools here in Greene County.

"The students get eggs, they raise the trout and they turn them loose into the streams," Butch said. "It's a real educational process. It teaches them how fish live and where they live, their cycles and so forth."

The Cherokee Chapter of Trout Unlimited has about 80 members. The group meets at 6 p.m. the third Monday of the month at Ryan's Steakhouse in Greeneville, and they're always looking for new members.

"As we get older, we're looking for new people to take up the torch for the fishing day as well as other responsibilities within

the club," Butch said.

"We're aging out," Bill added. Now that's a sad thought. After spending some time with Butch and Bill, it's hard to imagine the fishing day could ever be in better hands.

Katie Cronin started things for Greeneville's offense with a leadoff bunt single in the first inning, and she finished 4-for-4 with a double and a triple.

With two outs, Hanna Taylor knocked in Cronin with a two-run home run, one of seven Greeneville extra-base hits.

Lilly Million followed with a single to right field that Cumberland Gap misplayed, allowing her to reach third. She scored on a passed ball to give Greeneville a 3-0 lead.

Greeneville pounded out 16 hits with 10 players earning at least one. Million went 2-for-3 with a double, Jones went 2-for-2 with a double and Meredith Bailey went 2-for-3.

said. "For it to finally be coming around and everybody one through nine, and even our pinch-hitters, to be able to produce was great to see."

Greeneville added three

runs in the second inning started by Jones who smacked a double into left field.

Ashlyn White scored her by dropping a single into shallow right field. Cronin

followed by splitting the right-center gap with a triple, and Bailey pushed across Cronin with a sacrifice bunt to make it 6-0.

The Lady Devils added seven runs in the third inning with Foster scoring the first two with a homer to left field.

Jones and Elizabeth Phillips followed with singles and were scored on a groundout by White and a line drive to center field by Bailey.

Kelci Cantrell pushed across two runs when she pinned a triple in the left-field corner. Million put a double deep into the right-center gap to score Cantrell for a 13-0 lead.

Greeneville picked up the 15-0 lead necessary to end the contest early in the fourth inning. Cronin knocked in the first run with an RBI double. Bailey then scored Cronin with a shot to left field that ended the game.

Greeneville is now 8-8 overall and 4-3 in District 2-AA play. The Lady Devils play at North Greene at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Contract Bridge By Steve Becker

Thinking things through

South dealer.
East-West vulnerable.
NORTH
♠ J 10 9 3
♥ A K Q 4
♦ J 10 3
♣ 6 4

WEST
♠ K 6 5 2
♥ J 10 8 6
♦ 8 5
♣ A K Q

EAST
♠ 8 7 4
♥ 9 2
♦ 9 6
♣ J 10 9 8 3 2

SOUTH
♠ A Q
♥ 7 5 3
♦ A K Q 7 4 2
♣ 7 5

The bidding:
South West North East
1♦ Dble Redble 2♣
3♦ Pass 3♥ Pass
4♦ Pass 5♦
Opening lead — king of clubs.

Let's say you're declarer in five diamonds and West cashes two clubs and shifts to the jack of hearts. You win with the queen and draw two rounds of trump, but what do you do next?

There are two obvious chances for the contract. One is that the opposing hearts will divide 3-3, and the other is that a spade finesse will succeed if the hearts don't divide evenly.

Neither prospect is very attractive. First, the odds are against a suit

dividing 3-3, even if the opponents haven't bid. But given West's takeout double, he is more likely to have four hearts.

Second, you shouldn't invest even a plugged nickel on the chance of winning the spade finesse. West is virtually certain to have the king, as he could scarcely double without it.

Since these two probabilities add up to down one, you start looking for another way to make the contract. And if you look hard enough, you find the answer.

Assuming your initial conclusions are correct, West will have to guard both the hearts and the spades, in which case you can put him under extreme pressure by cashing your remaining trumps.

So you play the rest of your diamonds, reducing your hand to the A-Q of spades and 7-5 of hearts while retaining the jack of spades and A-K-4 of hearts in dummy.

On your last diamond, West must choose a discard from the K-6 of spades and 10-8-6 of hearts. He cannot spare a heart, so he discards the six of spades.

You now cash the A-K of hearts, on which East, as expected, shows out, and then lead the jack of spades toward your A-Q. After East follows low, you go up with the ace, since West's last two cards are almost surely the ten of hearts and king of spades, and the contract is home.

Lamb has a 3.77 grade point average and will graduate with honors. She is also a member of the National Honors Society.

Lamb chose Tennessee Tech for the campus and her relationship with Golden Eagles coach Kim Rosamond.

"It's such a safe community there, and I absolutely love coach Rosamond," she said. "She's followed me since eighth grade and has stuck with me. And when I went down there and saw everything, it was amazing. I just knew that's where I wanted to go."
